Overnight volunteers

As a team member, you help prepare and serve supper and breakfast for up to 80 homeless men. During the night, volunteers watch the security monitors in two-hour shifts. Dinner, breakfast and separate sleeping guarters are provided. Shelter team members work from 6:15 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. the following day.

Soup Kitchen volunteers

Lunch shifts run from 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday and from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Sundays. Volunteers may join a recurring team or fill in as substitutes on a short-term basis. Help prepare and serve dinner to overnight shelter guests as a monthly Dinner Leader. We also need Check in Leaders to assist shelter counselors as guests arrive each evening.

Computer lab volunteers

The computer lab is only open when volunteers are willing to take a shift. We need one to two volunteers at night to supervise and help guests with basic computer skills. We provide one on one training at your convenience. Shifts are Monday through Thursday, 7:30 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Samaritan faced a budget crisis in 2009 and had been in discussions about closing the Soup Kitchen on weekends. Around that same time, an anonymous donor passed away and the donor's estate plan established a permanently endowed fund at the

local charities. The donor had originally planned to support national human service organizations, but instead worked with the Foundation staff to leave a legacy in her own community. The distributions from that donor's fund alone to Samaritan since 2009 have totaled over \$410,000 and go to helping our hungry and homeless neighbors.

Sonija Kurosky, Samaritan's executive director. remembers the day Scott Wierman and Annette Lynch from the Foundation came to tell her about the new fund. "I was expecting a large check. I had no idea that their news would bring such a lasting impact on the Ministry."

Around Christmas in 2017, the Foundation staff brought good news to the Ministry once again. Yet another anonymous donor had established a fund through estate planning to benefit Samaritan. "I really credit the Foundation's staff for developing a relationship with this donor for over 25 years," said Kurosky. "Their stewardship of her gifts through the years led her to leave a legacy to help us fulfill our mission in the years to come."

If you haven't already, we hope you will consider a planned gift to feed and shelter our hungry and homeless neighbors. The Foundation is a great resource to learn more about your options. In 2017, 330 Soup Kitchen team members invested 32,850 hours of service, which is equivalent to 16 full-time staff members. In the shelter, 2,534 volunteers invested 34,209 hours of service, the equivalent to 17 full-time staff members. This army of volunteers has truly become the heartbeat of this Ministry, enabling our doors to be open every day to those in need.

Attendees will enjoy a catered lunch by the Samaritan Soup Kitchen staff, live music, door prizes, giveaways and be part of a very special program in which Samaritan will honor Myrtie Davis.

The Myrtie Davis Volunteer Servant Leadership Award was established in 2017 to honor long-time volunteers for selfless

At Samaritan Ministries, we are most commonly known for our Soup Kitchen and men's shelter. We offer several other programs and partnerships that help our guests become self-sufficient and gain independence. These additional resources help enable permanent housing, income and improved health, in addition to housing the United Health Centers clinics on Thursdays.

Project Cornerstone celebrated 22 years in 2017. In September of 2016, Michael came to Samaritan and entered Project Cornerstone. In 17 months, he has completely changed his life and is in the stages of transitioning to live on his own. Michael's passion for cooking and being in the restaurant business began when he was young. He recently completed a culinary cooking school program and we got to hear all about what he was learning. One day he was the one teaching the staff all of the different things you can make with roux, his new culinary word of that day.

Last month, Michael was greeting the staff coming in that morning with the biggest and most proud smile on his face. "I start my new job on Monday! God is so good!" he said with such excitement. His persistence in his recent job search and willingness to put himself out there landed him a job

Penny Campaign Raises \$51,258.14!

Samaritan's 2017 Penny Campaign was another incredibly successful fundraiser. The community came together and raised \$51.258.14.

Sonjia Kurosky, executive director, said "24,404 hot meals or over 1,985 nights of shelter can be provided with the amount of money raised. Every dollar donated helps someone in need".

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


Last year a housing specialist from **Experiment in Self-Reliance**, and our shelter counselors, helped place 89 guests into housing. The transition of these guests to permanent housing opens up space in our building for others who need the opportunity to get back on their feet.

The Empowerment Project has been housed at Samaritan since July of 2017. Their team operates as a street outreach group that connects homeless adults experiencing mental health or substance abuse disorders with resources enabling them to work on goals to improve their health and be able to live independently. Their partnership with the Wake Forest Baptist's Division of Faith and Health Ministries has been instrumental in serving those in need. Since they began their work last July, The Empowerment Project has reached over 370 people.

The Wake Forest University School of Law holds monthly expungement clinics, bringing law students together with people in the community to learn if they have any expungable charges and assist them through the process. Each month during the academic year, a clinic is

held at Experiment in Self-Reliance and the other at Samaritan. In February at the Samaritan clinic, 56 individuals were seen to discuss their situations, at no cost to them. Those that qualified will be contacted regarding the next steps to get the charge expunged.
