


SAM & Eggs: A Virtual Testimony of Hope— Thank you for your Support!

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Good News & Gratitude

Most of you have become very familiar with the virtual world over the last nine months.

The daily life here at Samaritan Ministries is anything but virtual. People are hungry. People need shelter. Recovery does not stop during a pandemic.



We have had to adapt and change, but the heart and soul of our ministry is in person. Since March, we have kept our doors open because our guests depend on us. Lunch is "to-go," and shelter space is reduced to allow for more social distancing. We serve a vulnerable population, and they need us now more than ever.

I listened to a guest tell his story a few weeks ago. He had been working for several years for a local catering business. When COVID-19 hit, the business closed, and Mark lost his job and apartment. He came to Samaritan to live while he gets back on his feet. He is working part time and hopes to be back on his own soon. COVID-19 is difficult for all of us to navigate but particularly for people who are already living on the edge.

Samaritan remains open and in person for people like Mark. We follow protocols of wearing masks, keeping at least six feet apart, and washing hands. Volunteers still show up at lunchtime seven days a week. We may not be able to join together for a meal around a table in the Soup Kitchen, but people still get a hot meal and an encouraging word daily.



William P.: A Powerful Story of Acceptance, Courage, and Recovery



Attendees of SAM & Eggs had a chance to hear compelling testimony from William P., a Project Cornerstone graduate, who still takes part in the program today. Samaritan Ministries is celebrating 25 years of helping homeless men in recovery through this successful and powerful program.

William came to Samaritan in 1992. He was addicted to drugs and alcohol and living on the streets. He was angry and afraid, but he knew that he desperately needed to change his life. His dream of being a major league baseball player did not pan out; and when his marriage failed, he stopped believing in himself and fell into a cycle of addiction and homelessness. Through the Project Cornerstone program, he began to develop job skills and slowly gained more and more confidence. He learned to talk about his problems and to ask for help. He learned that no matter what he does or what happens to him, he does not have to use to survive. He also found people who supported him, believed in him, and showed him love: "Everybody believed in me but myself."

Today, William is celebrating more than 21 years of sobriety. He still attends the weekly aftercare classes at Samaritan on Tuesday nights. He is a mentor to the men currently in the program and encourages them to believe in themselves and to open their hearts to the love and support they can find at Samaritan Ministries.

"I didn't understand that kind of love until I came to Samaritan. I thought it was phony. But everyone here has been so generous to me. I am so happy I came here."

William returns that love and generosity through his support of every person who comes through Project Cornerstone. "I've seen God work a lot of miracles in here and He is still working miracles," William said.

Augsburg Lutheran Church Donates Kitchen Equipment to Samaritan

While touring Samaritan Ministries as a member of Leadership Winston-Salem's Class of 2019, Rev. Paul Wollner, Senior Pastor at Augsburg Lutheran Church, learned that Augsburg was one of the five founding churches of Samaritan Ministries. That got him thinking about ways Augsburg could reconnect with Samaritan.

Early this year, Augsburg received a major gift from a parishioner who passed away. Part of the bequest was designated for new kitchen equipment. The new equipment suppliers offered to buy back the gently used equipment, but that did not feel quite right to Rev. Wollner. Instead, he and the other leaders of Augsburg wanted to find a way for the equipment be used to help others in need. That is when he called Jan Kelly, on her very first day as Executive Director of Samaritan.

"This gift came at just the right time," said Kelly.

"When we were offered Augsburg's convection oven, commercial refrigerator, commercial freezer and six burner stove, Derrick Newkirk, our Soup Kitchen Manager, and I were overjoyed. Our convection oven was on its last legs so this was a true blessing, and Derrick's eyes lit up when he realized we were getting what he calls the 'Cadillac' of stoves."

"Caring for the needs of those experiencing homelessness is an important part of Augsburg's identity," said Rev. Wollner. "In addition to rekindling a partnership with Samaritan, Augsburg has been a partner with City of Dwellings as one of their overflow shelters. This donation to Samaritan is one of many ways that we have experienced the church being open and sharing love with our neighbors even when we have been unable to worship together in person due to COVID-19 restrictions."

Another part of the same parishioner's bequest to Augsburg included a seven-year significant financial commitment to Samaritan Ministries. "We are so grateful for this financial bequest," said Kelly. "Remembering Samaritan in your will is a wonderful way to help those in need."
